Verses 13-15: The people gather the manna, discovering it tastes like wafers made with honey. They recognize it as the bread God has given them, a miraculous provision that meets their needs in the wilderness.

Verses 16-21: Instructions for gathering the manna are given, including the command to gather only what is needed for each day, with a double portion before the Sabbath. Some disobey and find leftovers spoiled, teaching a lesson about obedience and trust in God's timing.

Verses 22-26: On the sixth day, a double portion is provided so the people can rest on the seventh day, the Sabbath. God's command to rest is linked to His provision, establishing a rhythm of work and rest grounded in trust.

Verses 27-30: Some people go out to gather manna on the Sabbath and find none, leading to God's rebuke through Moses. The sanctity of the Sabbath is reinforced as a day of rest and reliance on God's provision.



Verses 31–36: The chapter closes with a description of the manna’s appearance and instructions for its preservation. A jar of manna is kept before the Lord as a testimony, symbolizing God’s ongoing faithfulness and the miraculous nature of His provision.

Key Themes

One key theme is divine provision, where God meets the physical needs of His people in a miraculous way that also teaches spiritual dependence. Another theme is obedience, as the people are called to follow God’s instructions regarding the gathering and use of manna, highlighting trust in His timing and commands. The Sabbath rest emerges as a vital theme, connecting God’s provision with a rhythm of work and rest that honors Him. Finally, the chapter emphasizes God’s presence and faithfulness, demonstrated through visible signs and ongoing care in the wilderness journey.

Cross-References

John 6:31–35 provides a New Testament perspective on manna, where Jesus identifies Himself as the true bread from heaven, deepening the understanding of God’s provision as ultimately fulfilled in Christ. Deuteronomy 8:3 recalls this chapter to remind Israel that God sustains life by His word, not by bread alone, emphasizing spiritual nourishment.
