Verse-by-Verse Study

Cross-References

Romans 1:16 clarifies Paul’s unashamed stance toward the gospel, reinforcing his example in 2 Timothy 1:8–12. 1 Timothy 4:14 provides insight into the laying on of hands and the impartation of spiritual gifts, which Paul references in verses 6–7. 2 Timothy 2:1–2 expands on the theme of faithful teaching and passing on the gospel message, complementing



verses 13–14. Finally, Acts 20:24 echoes Paul’s commitment to finishing his ministry despite hardship, paralleling the call to suffer for the gospel in this chapter.
