Verses 20–21: Jesus expands His prayer to include all future believers, asking that they may be one just as He and the Father are one, so that the world may believe in the divine mission of Jesus.

Verses 22–23: Jesus speaks of the glory given to believers, which unites them perfectly, mirroring the unity between the Father and the Son.

Verses 24–26: Jesus expresses His desire that believers be with Him to behold His glory and know the love of the Father through Him. He concludes by affirming that He has made the Father’s name known to them and will continue to do so.



Key Themes

The theme of glorification is central, revealing the mutual glorification between the Father and the Son as the foundation for eternal life. Unity is another dominant theme, emphasizing the oneness of believers modeled on the divine unity of Father and Son. Jesus' role as intercessor and High Priest is highlighted in His prayer for protection, sanctification, and joy for His followers.
