Israel & Jerusalem

Recent reports highlight the Israel365 summit in Jerusalem, where lawmakers, diplomats, military leaders, and Christian supporters convened to discuss Israel’s future, regional security, and strategies to shape public opinion following the events of October 7. Concurrently, European Union member states have asserted that they do not require unanimous consensus to hold Israel accountable for its actions, signaling a potential shift in EU policy toward Israel ([JNS](#); [Al Jazeera](#))

Wars & Security (Israel and Region)

The US-led Board of Peace announced on July 8 plans to establish a “pilot zone” in Gaza, designed to allow unarmed civilians who have been screened for Hamas affiliations to cross the Yellow Line into Israeli-controlled territory. This initiative aims to protect civilians amid ongoing tensions. Meanwhile, the Israel Defense Forces reported 13 ceasefire violations between June 30 and July 9, underscoring the fragile security situation in the region. In parallel, the Trump administration initiated the process of rescinding Syria’s designation as a State Sponsor of Terrorism, following a meeting between President Trump and Syrian President Ahmad al-Sharaa at the NATO summit in Ankara, reflecting evolving US-Syria relations. Additionally, the body of the late Iranian Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei was received in Iraq on July 8 for funeral rites in the Shiite holy cities of Najaf and Karbala. Notably, Iraq’s highest cleric did not attend the ceremonies, citing health reasons ([Long War Journal](#); [Long War Journal](#); [Long War Journal](#))

Further developments include a significant escalation as the United States Central Command conducted strikes against Iranian targets following Tehran’s condemnation of the revocation of US sanctions waivers. This followed an Iranian attack on commercial shipping in the Strait of Hormuz, prompting Washington to narrow its oil sanctions waiver and respond militarily, with both sides exchanging accusations. Meanwhile, historical analysis sheds light on the overlooked legacy of Muslim socialism, and reports detail the severe persecution of Christians by the Chinese Communist Party, highlighting ongoing

Additional coverage reports ongoing hostilities between the US and Iran, with new strikes exchanged after President Trump suggested the ceasefire was effectively over. In diplomatic developments, Qatar's active role in Middle East negotiations has raised concerns for the Trump administration regarding Iran talks. Moreover, European NATO officials have emphasized the need to regain "escalation dominance" over Russia within the next four years, following discussions at the recent Ankara summit, underscoring the strategic competition in the region ([FDD](#); [FDD](#); [Chatham House](#))

Collectively, these reports also highlight the "Shaping Global Order" exhibition at the 2026 London Conference, which addresses evolving international dynamics. Meanwhile, Hamas has announced its willingness to dissolve its governing institutions in Gaza and transfer authority to the National Committee for the Administration of Gaza, a body supported by the US and United Nations as part of the ceasefire framework. Israeli officials remain cautious as disarmament questions persist amid ongoing negotiations ([Chatham House](#); [Long War Journal](#))

Global Macro & Geopolitics

Steven Cook, Senior Fellow for the Middle East at the Council on Foreign Relations, stated on Bloomberg Surveillance that President Donald Trump appears reluctant to engage in full-scale war with Iran, though his ultimate strategy remains uncertain. In economic developments, Brazil's annual inflation unexpectedly slowed in June, strengthening arguments for further interest rate cuts by the central bank despite inflation still exceeding targets. Meanwhile, the International Energy Agency has revised downward its forecasts for Russian oil output due to ongoing Ukrainian attacks, reflecting the impact of conflict on global energy supplies ([Bloomberg](#); [Bloomberg](#); [Reuters](#))

Additional reporting notes that Iran and the United States have agreed on very little during recent discussions, notably choosing to avoid addressing religious freedom issues. This stalemate highlights the persistent challenges in US-Iran relations and the complexities surrounding religious liberty in the region ([Christianity Today](#))

AI Dominion, Deception & the Antichrist System

Zetrix artificial intelligence has signed a preliminary agreement with the Philippine government to help build the country's public blockchain infrastructure. The deal marks a



major expansion of the Malaysian firm's presence in Southeast Asia. Billed as the "world's first museum of artificial intelligence arts," Dataland uses wearables and troves of material from the Amazon to merge nature, biometrics, and art. Civil liberties groups say the Facewatch system in stores such as Sainsbury's and B&M is a 'dangerous escalation.' Facial recognition technology in shops will soon alert police in real time to the presence of serious offenders, with civil liberties groups warning of a "dangerous escalation" towards surveillance and criminalization in the retail sector. Senator Ed Markey proposed legislation aimed at curbing data centers and automated hiring systems, and addressing harm to children. US Senator Ed Markey is worried about the perils of unregulated artificial intelligence. What part? All of it: the costs associated with thirsty, energy-guzzling datacenters, intrusive workplace surveillance, bias in discriminatory algorithms, artificial intelligence overriding workers' judgments, and deepening economic ([The Guardian](#)).

Pestilence & Global Health

Recent scientific advances reveal that mRNA cancer vaccines can activate an unexpected immune cell type, enhancing tumor-fighting responses and challenging previous assumptions about vaccine mechanisms. This breakthrough may lead to more effective cancer vaccines and personalized treatment strategies. In parallel, researchers have identified a shared vulnerability among deadly gut bacteria such as E. coli and Shigella: enzymes that enable them to penetrate the gut's protective mucus layer. Targeting this common weakness could enable the development of a single vaccine to prevent multiple major diarrheal diseases. Additionally, Johns Hopkins scientists have developed a novel intranasal DNA vaccine for tuberculosis that enhances immune response by targeting bacteria that evade antibiotics. Animal studies demonstrated faster infection clearance, reduced lung inflammation, and prevention of relapse after treatment ([ScienceDaily](#); [ScienceDaily](#); [ScienceDaily](#))

Further research has uncovered a novel antiviral defense mechanism in sea anemones that differs fundamentally from human immune responses. This finding challenges long-standing views on the evolution of animal immune systems and suggests multiple evolutionary pathways for combating viral infections ([ScienceDaily](#)).

Natural Disasters & Signs in the Heavens



Recent seismic activity includes a magnitude 2.5 earthquake located 52 kilometers south-southwest of Whites City, New Mexico, at a depth of 6.10 kilometers, recorded on July 10 at 12:11 UTC. Additionally, a magnitude 4.5 earthquake occurred 57 kilometers west-southwest of Captain Cook, Hawaii, at a depth of 39.34 kilometers, also on July 10 at 06:17 UTC. Both events were classified with low impact severity ([USGS](#); [USGS](#))

Additional reports note ongoing forest fires in Angola, with a green alert issued for a fire that began on July 3 and continued through July 10, and another that started on June 26 and lasted until July 9. These incidents highlight persistent environmental challenges in the region ([GDACS](#); [GDACS](#))

Middle Eastern Artifacts

Archaeological excavations at Khirbat Jābir have uncovered twelve marble items in a bathhouse, including a female head sculpture and eleven architectural elements, such as a small Corinthian capital and a bracket adorned with a lion's head, reflecting the site's artistic richness. Additionally, pottery finds from the Byzantine through Early Islamic periods indicate continuous occupation and activity at Khirbat Jābir during these eras ([Israel Antiquities Authority](#); [Israel Antiquities Authority](#))

Further excavations at Khirbat Jābir in Zikhron Ya'akov revealed three distinct strata. The earliest, Stratum III, contained a well-preserved late Byzantine bathhouse dating to the sixth-seventh centuries CE, likely serving public functions. Subsequent layers included an Early Islamic building and Ottoman-period remains. Additionally, a salvage excavation conducted in August 1990 at Kefar Gevirol uncovered several architectural rooms, contributing to the understanding of the region's historical development ([Israel Antiquities Authority](#); [Israel Antiquities Authority](#))
