



Global Watch Daily – August 1, 2026

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A concise summary of significant developments in Israel and the world through a grounded Christian worldview.

Israel & Jerusalem

One hundred eleven lawmakers have expressed concern that a barrier constructed by residents of Carmel is preventing children from the Palestinian village of Umm Al-Kheir from attending school. Israeli officials counter that a safe alternative route is available. Meanwhile, settler violence against Palestinians is increasing in the West Bank, coinciding with the expansion of settlements and outposts. Hamas has announced its acceptance of a disarmament plan for Gaza, which would involve laying down arms and the withdrawal of Israeli troops from the territory ([JNS](#); [BBC News](#); [BBC News](#)).

The complex realities of politics, ongoing conflict, pervasive distrust, and the devastation in Gaza will complicate any agreement. If implemented, the disarmament plan could remove a major obstacle to advancing the Trump-backed peace initiative in Gaza. However, the path forward remains fraught with challenges ([BBC News](#); [BBC News](#); [Al Jazeera](#)).

Wars & Security (Israel and Region)

US President Donald Trump unveiled a 15-point roadmap from the Board of Peace that proposes transferring governance and security responsibilities in Gaza. The plan conditions verified Hamas disarmament on a phased Israeli withdrawal, though the sequencing of these steps remains a matter of dispute. In Afghanistan, three anti-Taliban resistance groups launched separate operations across Badakhshan province over two weeks, temporarily overrunning a district center and attacking Taliban positions in multiple districts, despite no evidence of direct coordination among the groups. Israel accused Hezbollah of launching an explosive-laden drone at its positions on the Ali Al Taher Ridge on July 29, violating a ceasefire that has been in effect since June 19. Hezbollah has neither claimed responsibility nor denied the Israeli allegations ([Long War Journal](#); [Long War Journal](#); [Long War Journal](#)).



Former Israeli Prime Minister Naftali Bennett has pledged to designate Qatar as an “enemy state” if reelected, citing Qatar’s alleged financial support for Iran’s Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps. Meanwhile, Egypt, which had previously observed Iran’s regional activities from a distance, experienced a drone strike on the port city of Damietta on July 29, damaging a U.S. gas facility and highlighting Iran’s expanding pressure campaign. On July 30, tens of thousands of migrants crossed from Morocco into Ceuta, a Spanish enclave on the North African coast, with many swimming around a breakwater amid lax Moroccan border controls; dozens drowned in the process. This surge in migration has exposed Spain’s ongoing challenges in managing border security and migration policy ([Long War Journal](#); [FDD](#); [FDD](#)).

The United States imposed two rounds of sanctions on Tehran within two days, on July 29 and 30, targeting elements of Iran’s activities in the strategic Strait of Hormuz. However, critics note that foreign financial enablers remain largely untouched. In northeastern Afghanistan, anti-Taliban resistance groups intensified their operations in Badakhshan province, resulting in the Taliban losing control of its first district in the region. Lebanese security forces conducted a raid on a residence in Beirut over a family dispute, during which they uncovered a large weapons cache. Interrogations reportedly revealed that the cache belonged to a member of Hezbollah ([FDD](#); [FDD](#); [Long War Journal](#)).

A 21-year-old German man, who reportedly had previously attempted to join the Islamic State, carried out a deadly vehicle-ramming attack at Berlin’s Pride festival, resulting in one death and 29 injuries. Former Marine and New York Times journalist Thomas Gibbons-Neff recently returned to Afghanistan seeking accountability and closure, specifically pursuing a Taliban commander he had confronted in 2010. Analysts Bill Roggio and Will Selber have evaluated the merits of Gibbons-Neff’s recent visit to the country ([Long War Journal](#); [Long War Journal](#)).

Global Macro & Geopolitics

Clashes have erupted between the Tigray People’s Liberation Front and the Ethiopian federal army in a contested area of northern Tigray, raising fears of renewed conflict. The previous war in Tigray from 2020 to 2022 resulted in approximately 600,000 deaths, and the region has yet to recover. The United States is engaged in mediation efforts to prevent further escalation. In India, the youth-led Cockroach Movement has gained momentum, with protests over leaked exam papers and rising unemployment leading to the resignation of the country’s education minister. Bloomberg News Senior Reporter Dan Strumpf discussed these developments and their implications. In the United States,



consumers are facing another surge in gasoline prices without the cushion of federal tax refunds that had previously mitigated the impact during earlier fuel cost spikes related to the Iran conflict ([France24](#); [Bloomberg](#); [Bloomberg](#)).

Pestilence & Global Health

An experimental antiviral pill successfully prevented the airborne and close-contact spread of a measles-like virus in ferrets. The medication was effective when administered shortly before or after exposure, reducing illness duration and contagiousness. Researchers suggest this drug could eventually be adapted for human use. Scientists have also restored the efficacy of vancomycin, a powerful antibiotic compromised by bacterial resistance, by pairing it with a small molecule called pghi-4 that inhibits a bacterial enzyme associated with resistance. Additionally, evolutionary theory is being applied to cancer treatment by rapidly switching therapies before tumors develop resistance, with mathematical models indicating that this approach could improve cure rates ([ScienceDaily](#); [ScienceDaily](#); [ScienceDaily](#)).

Researchers have mapped how influenza A virus commandeers human cells, revealing a surprising mechanism that dissolves nuclear structures to release proteins the virus uses for replication. This detailed molecular understanding may identify new drug targets and aid in the study of dangerous flu strains. Spermidine, a naturally occurring compound found in foods such as wheat germ, mushrooms, and aged cheese, may enhance vaccine responses in older adults. In a small pilot trial, adults over 65 who received spermidine supplements after their third COVID-19 vaccine dose showed improved immune protection ([ScienceDaily](#); [ScienceDaily](#)).

Natural Disasters & Signs in the Heavens

The United States Geological Survey recorded a magnitude 2.7 earthquake near Cloverdale, California, and a magnitude 5.6 earthquake near Port McNeill, Canada ([USGS](#); [USGS](#)).

Additionally, a magnitude 6.8 earthquake was recorded near Uto, Japan. Australia issued a green forest fire notification, indicating ongoing wildfire monitoring and response efforts (



[USGS](#); [GDACS](#)).

Middle Eastern Artifacts

The first volume of a two-part series presents the results of excavations at Paneas conducted by Z.U. Ma'oz in the area that housed the sanctuary of Pan (Paneion), established during the Roman period. Excavations revealed six squares with three distinct strata: Stratum I from the British Mandate era; Stratum II from the Middle Ages; and Stratum III from the Byzantine period. Most artifacts discovered correspond to these historical layers ([Israel Antiquities Authority](#); [Israel Antiquities Authority](#)).

A fragment of a large stele belonging to the Assyrian king Ashurbanipal (669–631 BC) was uncovered at Nineveh. The front side features a high-relief sculpture of the king, while the reverse side appears to document aspects of his reign. In the City of David, burnt sycamore beams dating to the First Temple period were discovered during the Givati parking lot excavation. Researchers believe these beams were part of the roof of an inner courtyard destroyed by fire ([BiblePlaces](#); [BiblePlaces](#)).
