Israel & Jerusalem

Local Palestinian sources reported that a Gazan militia supported by Israel captured an individual amid hostile fire. Retrospective analysis of the notorious United Nations conference on racism highlights its enduring impact on contemporary antisemitism and anti-Zionist sentiment. Unconfirmed local accounts indicate that following the discovery of a raid by an Israel-backed militia, the Israeli military conducted air and artillery strikes in Gaza ([JNS](#); [JNS](#); [BBC News](#)).

Al Jazeera reports that a post-Islamic Republic Iran could maintain significant power while adopting markedly different policies. This perspective is further explored in an analysis of Tehran, Jerusalem, and the evolving Middle East dynamics ([Al Jazeera](#); [JNS](#)).

Wars & Security (Israel and Region)

China, Russia, Iran, and North Korea have intensified their cooperation to an unprecedented degree, bolstering Russian military efforts in Ukraine and enhancing the lethality and resilience of Iran's regime, according to Bradley Bowman, senior director at the Foundation for Defense of Democracies' Center on Military and Political Power. Meanwhile, Iraq's initiative to disarm Iranian-backed militias faces increasing political opposition, as some factions seek to postpone or avoid the September deadline. The United States continues to pressure Baghdad to consolidate all weapons under state authority. Additionally, the Kurdish-led Syrian Democratic Forces have announced their dissolution, marking a significant shift in regional power dynamics ([Long War Journal](#); [Long War Journal](#); [Long War Journal](#)).

The United States has rescinded Syria's designation as a state sponsor of terrorism, a move coinciding with efforts to advance security dialogues between Syria and Israel. The Pentagon's ongoing review of U.S. military posture in Europe has prompted NATO allies to question the future extent of American forces on the continent. Concurrently, CIA Director John Ratcliffe has undertaken diplomatic engagements. Germany is increasing its defense



commitments, a development Washington has welcomed. Meanwhile, escalating trade tensions between the United States and Canada have resulted in reciprocal tariffs and public disputes, with China benefiting from the disruption in North American trade relations ([Long War Journal](#); [FDD](#); [FDD](#)).

The Trump administration's focus on university accountability, including combating discrimination and exposing foreign influence on campuses, has met resistance from higher education lobbyists. In Afghanistan, the Taliban have secured notable victories with the surrender of dissident commander Juma Khan Fateh and the death of senior National Resistance Front leader Hasib Panjshiri, even as armed resistance attempts to gain momentum ([FDD](#); [Long War Journal](#)).

Jessica Bowie was arrested on August 19, accused of plotting to bomb the New York State Capitol in support of the Islamic State. This case marks the fifth Islamic State-linked terrorism incident in the United States this year. Venezuela's recovery from the devastating earthquakes of June 24 has become increasingly costly, with rising death tolls and extensive infrastructure damage. Reconstruction efforts strain the fragile economy, although Caracas's oil sector has seen a surge in sales ([Long War Journal](#); [Long War Journal](#)).

Global Macro & Geopolitics

BBC correspondents in Delhi and Moscow examine the Indian Prime Minister's public appeal for peace with Russia, reflecting complex strategic calculations amid great-power rivalry. Chinese exporters benefit from growing demand driven by artificial intelligence applications, although decades of technological investment have not fully resolved supply chain inefficiencies. In a Bloomberg Intelligence podcast, experts discuss why about 80% of industry sectors still face supply chain challenges despite extensive modernization efforts ([BBC News](#); [Bloomberg](#); [Bloomberg](#)).

Pestilence & Global Health

A year-long study found that omega-3 supplements combined with low-dose aspirin matched the effectiveness of antibiotics in treating severe gum disease, with approximately 58% of patients reaching treatment goals. This finding suggests potential alternative therapies that could reduce reliance on antibiotics. A study involving over



500,000 older adults revealed that recipients of the Shingrix shingles vaccine were 24% less likely to develop dementia over four years, estimating one dementia case prevented per 17 vaccinated individuals. In Australia, backyard bird feeders have become potential hotspots for the spread of H5N1 avian influenza, as they bring together species that rarely interact naturally. Experts advise ceasing feeding, or at minimum reducing food quantities, avoiding hand-feeding, and maintaining rigorous cleaning to mitigate risks ([ScienceDaily](#); [ScienceDaily](#); [ScienceDaily](#)).

Researchers have demonstrated that artificial intelligence can predict an individual's vaccine responsiveness by analyzing antibody patterns in over 4,000 subjects. Indicators of "immune readiness" distinguished strong responders from weak ones, with some unexpected findings regarding immune system behavior ([ScienceDaily](#)).

Natural Disasters & Signs in the Heavens

The United States Geological Survey recorded a magnitude 0.6 earthquake near Borrego Springs, California, and a magnitude 4.9 earthquake near Pangai, Tonga ([USGS](#); [USGS](#)).

Green forest fire alerts have been issued in the Russian Federation and Angola, indicating ongoing wildfire activity in these regions ([GDACS](#); [GDACS](#)).

Middle Eastern Artifacts

In February 2001, a salvage excavation was conducted at the Bet Ha-Gaddi site (Permit No. A-3370/2001; map ref. 16334/59220) after infrastructure works damaged antiquities. The excavation was carried out on behalf of the Israel Antiquities Authority and funded by the Jewish community. Another excavation (Permit No. A-3508/2001; map ref. 18584/58707) was also undertaken under similar auspices ([Israel Antiquities Authority](#); [Israel Antiquities Authority](#)).

In August 1999, a trial excavation took place at the El'ad site (Permit No. A-3107/1999; map ref. 195077-90/662121-32).
