Understanding prophecy’s role invites believers to live with intentionality and faithfulness. First, prophecy calls us to trust God’s promises, knowing that His word will not fail. This trust should shape our daily walk, encouraging perseverance amid trials.

Second, prophecy warns us to examine our hearts and repent of sin. The certainty of Christ’s return and final judgment should motivate holiness and godly fear. We are reminded to “watch and pray” (Mark 13:33), maintaining spiritual vigilance.

Finally, prophecy fills us with hope that transcends present circumstances. The promise of a new heaven and new earth, where righteousness dwells (2 Peter 3:13), inspires joy and



steadfastness. As believers, we are called to proclaim this hope to a world in darkness, bearing witness to the coming kingdom of God.
