



Study Guide: Psalms – Chapter 119

Verses 89-96: The eternal nature of God's word is celebrated as a firm foundation amid the fleeting nature of the world.



Verses 97–104: The psalmist's love for God's law is likened to a treasure, providing wisdom that surpasses enemies and teachers.

Verses 105–112: God's word is described as a lamp and light, guiding the psalmist through darkness and affliction.

Verses 113–120: The psalmist contrasts the righteous love for God's law with the hatred of the proud, seeking God's protection.

Verses 121–128: A call for justice and deliverance is made, with a commitment to obey God's precepts despite opposition.

Verses 129–136: The psalmist marvels at the wonderful nature of God's commandments and pleads for revival and mercy.

Verses 137–144: The righteousness of God's decrees is affirmed, with a declaration of trust and love for His statutes.

Verses 145–152: The psalmist calls out to God with faithfulness, confident that His word sustains through trials and enemies.

Verses 153–160: A plea for deliverance is made, emphasizing the eternal truth and justice found in God's commands.

Verses 161–168: Despite persecution, the psalmist rejoices in God's testimonies and commits to keeping His precepts faithfully.
