The psalm also highlights God's attentive response to prayer, demonstrating that divine help is both personal and powerful. Finally, the theme of preservation and protection reflects a confident hope in God's ongoing care amid adversity, encouraging believers to rely on God's faithfulness throughout life's challenges.

Cross-References

Psalm 138's emphasis on God's steadfast love and faithfulness resonates with Psalm 136, which repeatedly celebrates God's enduring mercy. The theme of God's exaltation above all gods recalls Psalm 97, where God's kingship is declared over all the earth. The personal



testimony of answered prayer parallels passages like Psalm 34:17, affirming that the Lord hears the righteous in distress. Finally, the assurance of God's preservation connects with Isaiah 41:10, where God promises to uphold and strengthen His people, reinforcing the psalm's message of divine protection.
