Verses 11-15: John then sees a second beast rising from the earth, described as having two horns like a lamb but speaking like a dragon. This beast exercises the authority of the first beast and performs great signs, even making fire come down from heaven. It deceives the earth's inhabitants by promoting the worship of the first beast and by creating an image that can speak and cause death to those who refuse to worship it. This second beast represents a religious or ideological power that supports and enforces the political beast's agenda.

Verses 16-18: The chapter concludes with the infamous description of the mark of the beast, required for buying and selling. The mark is either on the right hand or forehead, symbolizing allegiance and identification with the beast's system. The number 666 is given as the number of the beast, inviting wisdom to interpret it. This number has been the subject of extensive commentary and is generally understood as a symbol of imperfection and opposition to divine completeness.



Key Themes

One key theme is the manifestation of evil through political and religious powers that oppose God's kingdom. The beasts symbolize systems that combine blasphemy, deception, and persecution. Another theme is the call to endurance and faithfulness amid trials, emphasizing that the saints must remain steadfast despite intense opposition.
