



## Global Watch Daily – March 21, 2026

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A concise summary of significant developments in Israel and the world through a grounded Christian worldview.

### **Israel & Jerusalem**

Israel has withdrawn from the upcoming Billie Jean King Cup in Bosnia, citing security concerns related to traveling in a Muslim-majority country and the participation of teams from Egypt and Morocco. Meanwhile, communities in Michigan continue to demonstrate resilience and faith by holding bar and bat mitzvah celebrations despite recent attacks, underscoring a commitment to normalcy and tradition ([Times of Israel](#); [JNS](#)).

In the United States, a Texas judge has blocked a residential project designated for Muslims due to utility board violations, reflecting ongoing tensions surrounding radical Islam in the region. Additionally, Iranian and Romanian nationals have been charged for attempting to breach the UK's nuclear submarine base at Faslane, highlighting persistent security threats in Western countries ([JNS](#); [Times of Israel](#)).

### **Wars & Security (Israel and Region)**

Authorities in Kuwait and the UAE have reported the disruption of domestic Hezbollah cells, although the Lebanese group denies having operatives in the Gulf. Concurrently, U.S. airstrikes continue targeting Iran-backed Iraqi militias, with Kataib Hezbollah declaring a temporary ceasefire regarding attacks on the U.S. Embassy in Baghdad. These developments take place amid ongoing U.S. efforts to reopen the Strait of Hormuz, a critical maritime chokepoint for global energy supplies ([Long War Journal](#); [FDD](#)).

In a broader geopolitical context, Finland's President Stubb has called Brexit a "colossal mistake" while advocating for a flexible partnership between the EU and the UK to enhance cooperation in security, technology, and economic matters. Meanwhile, Iran continues its regional aggression with drone and missile attacks on ports, oil and gas facilities, and U.S. bases across the Middle East, underscoring the volatility of the region ([Chatham House](#); [Long War Journal](#)).

### **Global Macro & Geopolitics**



Fans worldwide rejoiced as BTS reunited for their first concert in nearly four years, marking a cultural milestone celebrated across social media. In contrast, the entertainment world mourns the loss of Nicholas Brendon, known for his role in *Buffy the Vampire Slayer*, who passed away at age 54. On the geopolitical front, the U.S. is escalating its military presence in the Middle East by deploying additional Marines amid ongoing conflict, while Syria's government pledges to avoid further regional escalation despite the war's backdrop ([BBC News](#); [France24](#)).

Further complicating regional security, foreign nationals and Myanmar rebel groups have been implicated in plots against India, though media coverage has been inconsistent. Meanwhile, Japanese politician Takaichi has earned praise from former President Trump for her diplomatic efforts, despite avoiding firm security commitments related to the Iran conflict, reflecting the delicate balance of international relations ([The Diplomat](#); [The Diplomat](#)).

## **Pestilence & Global Health**

A shingles vaccine has demonstrated remarkable benefits beyond its original purpose, reducing major cardiac events by nearly half and lowering deaths by two-thirds in high-risk individuals within one year. This finding highlights the interconnectedness of infectious disease prevention and cardiovascular health, offering a promising avenue for reducing the burden of heart disease ([ScienceDaily](#)).

In cutting-edge research, scientists have identified tiny rocket engines inside malaria parasites powered by a hydrogen peroxide reaction, a discovery that could inspire new drugs and innovations in microscopic robotics. Additionally, a novel DNA origami vaccine platform, DoriVac, is showing strong immune responses in early studies, potentially surpassing mRNA vaccines in stability and manufacturability for diseases such as COVID-19, HIV, and Ebola ([ScienceDaily](#); [ScienceDaily](#)).

MIT researchers have discovered that the gut protein intelectin-2 plays a dual role in defending against harmful bacteria by strengthening the mucus barrier and trapping pathogens, including antibiotic-resistant strains. Meanwhile, a major clinical trial found that high-dose vitamin D3 does not reduce COVID-19 severity but may slightly lower the risk of developing long COVID symptoms, providing new insights into post-viral syndromes ([ScienceDaily](#); [ScienceDaily](#)).



Research also indicates that severe COVID-19 or influenza infections may increase lung cancer risk years later due to chronic inflammation in lung tissue, though vaccination appears protective against these dangerous changes. These findings underscore the importance of vaccination and long-term monitoring of respiratory viral infections ([ScienceDaily](#)).

### **Natural Disasters & Signs in the Heavens**

Recent seismic activity includes a magnitude 1.9 earthquake north of Yakutat, Alaska, and another of the same magnitude southwest of Rachel, Nevada, both recorded by USGS. Additionally, a smaller 1.1-magnitude quake occurred near The Geysers, California, reflecting ongoing tectonic activity in the western United States ([USGS](#); [USGS](#); [USGS](#)).

NASA's experimental quiet supersonic X-59 aircraft completed its second flight despite a technical issue, gathering valuable data for future tests aimed at reducing sonic booms. Furthermore, restoration of the historic Hangar One in the San Francisco Bay Area has been completed, preserving a key landmark in early aviation history. Weather patterns indicate heat in the Southwest, fire weather risks in the Central U.S., and a Kona Low impacting Hawaii, illustrating diverse atmospheric conditions across the country ([NASA](#); [NASA](#); [weather.gov](#)).

### **Middle Eastern Artifacts**

Archaeologists in Upper Egypt have uncovered approximately 3,000 ostraca pottery fragments this season, bringing the total at the site to around 43,000—the largest known collection from a single location in Egypt. This discovery offers unprecedented insights into ancient Egyptian daily life and craftsmanship. Meanwhile, the Israel Museum plans to open an exhibition titled “The Girl Who Wrote” once war restrictions are lifted, with online activities available for children during closures.
